

At last the new factory at La Villiaze is nearly completed. Designed in Portland by Wolff and Zimmer, work was not started until last July. However, dry conditions in Autumn & early winter enabled the roof to be on by December. Concrete work was held up, however by the cold January and February but Gamble and Blair(Contractors) were undaunted and had the walls up by the end of February. Since then, plant installation has come along rapidly & recently the tile floor was laid and well polished. Partitions are now being finished as are the loading bay and air conditioning plant. Inside, the ive green floor contrasts with e red brick walls and the white

ceiling.

The benches are already being moved into place and the large windows provide good illumination without the aid of the hundreds of florescent lights. The conditioning is quite amazing to those not familiar with this type of plant. Vast fans push hot and cold air through silencing boxes and a maze of insulated ducting to many mixing cabinets situated throughout the plant, controlling temperature and humitity. By the time this magazine is published, the Facilities Group will have added the final touches inside the building whilst the car park and grounds are being laid out.

Although the building is not so revolutionary, a contemporary trend is quite evident throughout. Work is now progressing rapidly so that the completion date of the 7th September can be achieved and we hope to have more comments in the next issue.

Personal Achievments In Tek.....

In recent months, the Model Shop has manufactured two very useful machines.

One of these machines used to stretch wire before it is issued to assembly. This is done chiefly for appearance reasons and in Tek Guernsey's early days this was done by unrolling the reels on the floor of the Plant!

As our requirements grew, it was necessary to make a hand operated machine, and then an automatic to do the job. The idea for the automatic came from Doug Paul but after he left the island there were only rough sketches of the machine available.

More detailed drawings we produced and Bernie Savage, o the Model Shop was mainly responsible for the building of the machine. Various snags were encountered during the initial stages, but these have now been overcome and the machine is now operational in the model shop. Later it will be transferred to production shop who will provide service for assembly.

A capacitor winding machine has also been built recently. This is similar to one supplied from Beaverton to our capacitor dept. Barry Tullier was entrusted with the work of producing the machine with the help of drawings from Beaverton and local drawings made from measurements taken from the machine already in our plant.
The Guernsey made machine

differs from the American one in the type of drive motor and in materials used. An added feature to the local machine is a built-in florescent light.

Tek Limited is really international these days with the folks from Switzerland, Holland and Denmark. It's a coincidence that two of our chaps, Bob Keiser from Switzerland and Claus Olsen from Denmark should have gained honors in the same sport, rowing. Claus was prominent in the Henley



Regatta of 1955 when, in the 'Coxed Fours' event, he represented a club which won the Ratchcreedan Challenge Cup. The same crew went on to win, on the Serpentine, the News Chronicle cup for London and Visitors. Whilst at Henley, Claus and partner won the Maidenhead School Cup for double sculls.


