Studying Business Methods



A visitor to Tektronix Guernsey during January was Siebolt (Siep) Nieuwenhuis, a twenty year old Dutch university student.

Siep spent a month working in Materials and other departments. He is currently completing a two year course at N.O.I.B. Nyenrode (a Dutch university) where he is studying business methods.

As part of his studies, he was required to spend a month in a Dutch factory and in a factory abroad. Last year, he spent a month in a factory in Holland that manufactures office furnishings. He wrote to several foreign companies in an effort to arrange a visit, but met with no success.

Finally a relative in Heerenveen contacted Tektronix Holland, and after Siep had met Larry Mayhew, his visit to Tektronix Guernsey was arranged.

Materials

Most of his time in Guernsey was spent studying the methods and systems used in the Materials group, and assisting in some of the work. Siep also visited the other departments at La Villiaze, Victoria Avenue, and Albany House.

Impressed

Talking to Tektopics before he returned to Holland, Siep remarked how impressed he had been with the friendliness of the Guernsey people. "I had imagined them to be all bowler hats and rolled umbrellas" he said.

He thought that Tektronix should be congratulated on their organisation in Guernsey. He had particularly noticed the 'performance review' system of wage increase, and thought it very fair to the employee. He also liked the practice of using Christian names throughout the company. "People seem to discuss problems together more readily" he said, "The use of surnames creates a gulf between employee and management which you avoid."

Island

Living on Guernsey he thought, had both advantages and disadvantages. Among the advantages he listed were the comparatively cheap cigarettes and petrol.

Finally, he sent his thanks to all the Tektronix personnel who had given up their time to answer his queries.

Following a request by Susan Le Page, secretary of the Ladies College Scientific Society, Alan Richmond of Tektronix Ltd. Field Training, assisted by Derek Sparkes, presented the film "The Oscilloscope Draws a Graph" followed by a demonstration of the Type 564 and several plug-ins.

The event took place in the College lecture theatre on November 14th and some forty members of the Society were present. The meeting closed with a short question and answer session and tea and school-baked cakes in the Headmistress's study.



La Villiaze Extension

Work is now progressing on the 35,200 square feet extension to La Villiaze factory. Early in February the main supports were completed and work commenced on the erection of the steelwork.

On Schedule

Talking to Tektopics, personnel manager Walt Morrison said that so far the work was on schedule, however at this early stage the contractors are very dependent on the weather. Work on the roof is expected to start early in March, this should be complete by the end of April. The contractors will then lay the floor blocks, this will be completed early in June. During June and July the floor will be screeded and the tiles laid.

Facilities

Our own Facilities department, under Jack Lambert, will be carrying out a considerable amount of the work on this project. They have already installed the new lighting and air-conditioning in the existing stock area. This area will house a 40 ft. extension of the Test area and the Assembly area. Jack estimated that this area would be ready for occupation towards the end of January 1968.

Whilst the contractors are working on the roof of the new extension, the Facilities group will be installing heating and lighting. The heating will be provided by a new boiler shortly to be installed in the existing loading bay.

New Offices

In August, Facilities will start work in the extension constructing a new Lecture room, conference room, and office for Materials and Production Control. These should be ready in October. Materials and Stock will then move into the extension, and the contractors will relay and tile the floor of the present stock area.

Facilities will convert the present Materials offices to a 800 square feet extension of the canteen dining area, and a new 800 square feet Staff Engineering department.

Tektronix Limited

An area of 10,000 square feet in the south east corner of the new building will be occupied by Tektronix Limited in the Autumn. This will be used to house the warehouse at present at Victoria Avenue. The new car park for 68 cars will be constructed on the east side of the factory, this is scheduled for completion in October. The area now occupied by Staff Engineering, Production Control and the Conference Room will be taken over by Finance.
