## Sony/Tek ready for next two decades

TOKYO—We're ready for the challenges of the next two decades.

That's the word from Sony/Tektronix as management and employees reminisced one more time about last month's 20th anniversary celebration which included a ceremony, private shows, dinners, tours, board meetings, presentations and distinguished visitors.

At the half-hour anniversary ceremony on May 16, Oregon Governor Victor Atiyeh brought congratulatory greetings from the state. Other speakers included Akio Morita (Board chairman, Sony Corporation), Earl Wantland (Tektronix president) and Takashi Kumakura (Sony/Tektronix president).

The Tek Board of Directors presented a commemorative plaque to Sony/Tek for achieving 20 years of growth, prosperity and accomplishment in pursuing its business mission, and Information Display Group presented a silver tray engraved with the Kanji character of "crane," depicting long life.

Attending the ceremony were members of the Oregon Economic Development Office, top management from Sony and Tektronix and 100 Sony/Tek employees.

A tour of Sony/Tek's 20th anniversary private show followed for officials and special guests before it was opened to some 7500 engineers and customers. Total attendance at both the Tokyo and Osaka shows reached 8700, a significant increase over two years ago

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Special interest at the private show centered on the 6000 Series Engineering Workstations and the "High Technology" corner which included electron optics, GaAs IC, super bright color CRT for avionics, liquid crystal color shutter, high speed A-D converter, high resolution monitor, high speed/high performance IC and high resolution EL display panel by PLANAR Systems.

In addition, some 3500 attended 22 technical seminars during the two-day show on products, applications and high technology. The theme lecture was given by Junichi Nishizawa, professor at Tohoku University and inventor of the PIN diode, semiconductor laser and static induction transistor. Some 1500 persons attended his presentation with many watching on closed circuit monitors in other locations.


