Dubner earns a second Emmy

Dubner Computer Systems, a wholly owned subsidiary of Grass Valley Group since 1984, has earned a second Emmy, this time for its contribution to Colorization™ of black and white video, most of which originates as copies of old Hollywood films.

Since 1982, Dubner has worked closely with Colorization, Inc., a Canadian company, to develop special software for the Dubner CBG and TEXTA animation systems. At the annual ceremonies of the

National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences, engineering Emmy awards were presented to Dubner, Colorization, Inc., and Color Systems Technology of Los Angeles, which uses a different system for similar results.

Dubner founder Harvey Dubner says Colorization "is a controversial process and we all have our individual viewpoints, but clearly the viewers like it. (Our) Emmy is recognition that the com-

pany's technology and expertise is at the cutting edge of new developments in animation and character generators."

Dubner won an Emmy in 1982 for its CBG-2 Video Graphics Generator. DCS is located in Paramus, New Jersey.
