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In New York **Emmy award presented to Tek**

NEW YORK CITY—The lights were low and the candles flickered in the Imperial Ballroom of the Sheraton Centre Hotel on September 11 as the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences presented its Engineering Emmy awards for 1983-84.

Tektronix' Television Division received one of these coveted awards for over 30 years participation and contributions to the test, measurement and monitoring of the television signal.

Dave Friedley (Communications Group Vice President) accepted the Emmy and credited the contributions of hundreds of past and present Tek Television people who helped the company achieve this honor.

In his acceptance speech, Dave called special attention to the contributions of former employee Charlie Rhodes for his foresight and catalytic leadership. Charlie was unable to attend the presentation.

Over 500 people from the television technical community gathered to honor Ampex, Sony, RCA, Lexicon, Kudelski (Nagra) and Tektronix as they received their Emmy awards.

Joining Dave from the Television Division were Larry Kaplan (General Manager), Steve Kerman (Marketing Manager) and Austin Basso (National Sales Manager). Two other Tek's whose

Tek guests Steve Bonica (Engineering Vice President, NBC), Vern Pointer (Vice President, Broadcast Engineering, ABC) and Alan Godber (Engineering Manager, CBS) rounded out the Tek table.

"You never expect to actually hold one of these statues," remarked Larry Kaplan after the ceremony. "I wish all the people in the Division could share this moment. This is really their award too."
