### what is the truth?

When two people disagree, most of us believe that one of them must be wrong and the other must be right. The same idea is widely held at Tektronix. If a workleader and a member of his work group disagree, most people assume that one must be wrong and the other must be right.

The Human Relations group frequently hears several different people describe the same situation. Usually each person tells a story somewhat different from the others we have heard. In such a case you may ask:

"Well, how do you know what the truth really is?"

In our experience, most people really want to tell the truth; most people really strain to be objective. They know when their feelings are running high and try to take this into account when they report an incident between themselves and another person. However, no person can accurately report everything that happened in a given incident. Even when you have no "ax to grind", you can't remember everything that happened. As a matter of fact, you probably weren't even aware of everything that happened.

When you remember that your point of view is different from the other person's point of view, it is easy to see why two different people will give different accounts of the situation, although each will be trying as hard

as he can to tell the truth.

Think of the great difference in background between various people. Differences in the way we were treated by our parents when we were children, differences in the schools we went to, differences in the cities and in the school groups we have associated with while we were growing up, differences in the kinds of jobs we have had, differences in our homes, our marriages, and differences in our children. When you think of the tremendous number of differences among all the people here at Tektronix, is there any reason that any two people should see a given incident in the same way? No, I think we have to accept this diversity and recognize that no two people can see things in exactly the same way.

The question, then, becomes not, "Well, what is the truth in the matter?" but "How does each person see it?" The solution becomes one of

helping each person understand the other person's point of view.

I wonder if we would get along somewhat easier with each other if we adopted a different attitude toward disagreements. Rather than asking "Who's wrong?" and "Who's right?", we might ask "How do you see it?" and "How do I see it?" and "Why do we see this in different fashions?" I suspect that we would discover that there is some truth on both sides and that there is some error on both sides.

We would probably also discover that it is more important to attempt to understand the other person's point of view than to prove that he is wrong

and you are right.

"What is the truth?" This is never a simple question.

## Tek-Built Polygraphs Help Heart, Neurology Research

Among new equipment received by the University of Oregon Medical School recently are two polygraphs, the only machines of their kind, built as a "one-shot" special project by a group of interested Tektronix engineers.

The devices, used in neurology and cardiology research and clinical evaluation, are designed to measure all types of biological electrical activity. They may be used to make electrocardiograms and electroencepehalograms, as well as to measure oxygen tension in the blood and the action potential of nerve cell bodies.

In the neurology division, the polygraph is being used to study blood circulation in hamsters and rabbits.

Medical school personal describe the machines as flexible, reliable and highly sensitive.

#### Portable Units

The polygraphs, according to the Tek engineers who developed them, are double rack-mounted for easy moving from room to room. Each contains two oscilloscopes, an RM15 and an RM32.

The RM32 displays all channels, in conjunction with preamplifiers put into a type 127 preamp power supply. The RM15 shows one trace at a time of the RM32 display on an expanded-time basis.

The polygraph is important because it allows the technician to obtain a variety of data at the same time from a patient or experimental animal.

# Activity Seen on RT Land at Hillsboro

Otto Zach, business manager of Tektronix Employees Retirement Trust, gave City Manager J.W. Barney of Hillsboro a check for \$35,000 February 25 to buy a 55-acre city-owned tract adjoining the east end of Hillsboro airport and about a mile east of the city.

The tract eventually will be developed for residential use, Otto said.

To protect the runway for instrument landing, height of the buildings will be limited on most of the tract and building will be restricted on 11 acres.

Organ Company Builds

On other Retirement Trust property, located on the airport's west edge, Rodgers Organ company of West Slope has begun construction of a manufacturing plant and sales office.

The firm, composed largely of ex-Tekronix employees, will move into its

new location about June 1.

The 12,000-square-foot tiltup concrete building will house the entire Rodgers operation, now located at West Slope. It will be adequate for as many as 40 employees. The Contractor is Ron Miller of Hillsboro. Rodgers company is leasing the land from the Retirement Trust.

## Tek Employees Give 317 Pints of Blood

Tektronix employees in record numbers gave blood at the Beaverton plant during the February 12 visit of the Red Cross mobile unit, according to Don Pratt (Production Planning), plant blood chairman.

A total of 317 employees contributed blood. In addition, 25 with type A-positive blood were turned away until the special March 1 drawing for an open-heart operation.

Thirty-five volunteers were rejected for health reasons.

By comparison, 25 Teks responded at the previous bloodmobile visit, and 290 the time before that.

# Officers Express Approval After Visit to Guernsey

"Our impression was that they (our workers on Guernsey) are doing a good job, that the operation has considerable potential and that morale and attitude are good."

This was Treasurer Don Ellis's comment after he, Bob Davis and Byron Broms completed a two-week visit to Guernsey February 27.

It was the first trip for any of them to the plant, although Bob had visited the island before Tektronix moved there.

Byron talked with the plant staff about the market outlook and discussed means of improving communications between Guernsey and Portland, including orders for instruments and parts.

Don's main concern was with accounting, and financial problems, auditing and communication of information. He also talked about how taxes relate to the Guernsey operation and what form of corporate organization would be best.

Bob, besides obtaining an overall picture of Guernsey problems and goals was particularly interested in the manufacturing process.

A major topic was the effort being made to obtain "commonwealth preference" for Tektronix instruments, which will mean they can be sold in the United Kingdom duty-free.

Pressures on the board of trade by British industry are resulting in increased duty restrictions, Byron explains, particularly against products competing with domestic manufactures.

To obtain commonwealth preference status, Tektronix must go deeper into the manufacturing process. We must contribute at Guernsey at least half the manufacturing cost of each instrument approved. In other words, the product must be considered part of the United Kingdom's economy before it is granted preference.





The Bundle of His (say Hiss) which are nerve fibers responsible for keeping the lower part of the heart beating in time with the upper part of the heart must be located exactly when surgeons repair holes in the wall between the two ventricular chambers. With a probe developed by engineers of Cubic Corporation through a cooperative effort with doctors interested in heart surgery, the Tektronix oscilloscope is used to monitor signals of the order of 500 microvolts.
