Thanks again Luc, for your great idea.


### **New Arrival**


Aart comes to us from Special Electronics and Designs of Kincardine, Ontario where he has worked for the past two years.

Our thanks go to John Landis who made it possible for "International" to be involved in the "Masters 1984" program.


Our special thanks go to Anita Wallace and Donna Thomson. These girls not only made it happen, but made it happen perfectly.

The organization put on by Tek and the assured quality of everything that took place during that week was just impeccable.


I would certainly encourage any sales person to try to become a "MASTER" because the prize that you will win is certainly an experience that you will remember for a long time.

### Wanted Dead or Alive!




