




TEKTROND

Although Tektronix has been in Guernsey for over five years, 1963 has undoubtedly seen more rapid advance and expansion in our Island's part in Tek's Worldwide operations than ever before. Of all the "comings and goings," there are two that must be rated most significant.

Firstly, the establishing of Tektronix Limited, a marketing and distribution company for the whole of Europe. Tek. realised that the pace of expansion and modernisation of industry in Europe was rapidly quickening and that in order to keep pace, we required an efficient, concentrated and knowledgable centre of operations. Guernsey, with it's expanding manufacturing plant and central position already had many international marketing functions set up and was therefore an obvious choice. The whole top floor of the "just completed" Albany was leased as was a nearby warehouse. Soon, regular shipments of instruments were arriving from America and after checking and allocation, were being flown all over Europe. Customer Service Spares, already well established, was expanded; as was Field Training under Ted Marguerit.

Meanwhile Tektronix Guernsey Ltd. had been preparing to move into it's new assembly factory at La Villiaze & eventually, on September 7-9th, the great move "happened". Without delay, work continued encountering remarkably few problems. Although the inside was operational, the grounds were by no means complete and even now the final touches are being added. Later the lawns will be laid and bushes and trees planted.

At Victoria Avenue however, rebuilding was held up pending development decisions. These have now been made and we learn that an 8,800 sq. ft. extension to La Villiaze is to be made. Stock and its associated functions will move into

this area.

This year has seen the departure of several well known faces. In May, Dave Spinks left for Beaverton after living here for about five years. There he has taken a post in Central Staff Services.

In July, Al Hannmann came back from Australia to pick up his family and leave us for good. Al made many good friends in Guernsey, both in and out of Tek and incidentally, is anybody interested in buying some Hi-Fi equipment. Don Alvey left for Beaverton in October where he is to represent our interests as International Marketing Manager. By the way, he took his "E Type" Jaguar with him, quite a

challenge for those Oregon "Cops", our

money's on Don.

By June, "TEKTOPICS" was born, a short but happy struggle. Our first issue was sufficiently well received to ensure the future but we never dreamed at that time of producing an issue such as this. Around the same time, Bob Gwyn visited Beaverton, he was most impressed by the pioneering spirit of the country and the fishing grounds. Roy Falla arrived home from America and gave us an interview in our 2nd. issue. He is now Manufacturing Engineer at La Villiaze.

In September, Tekem was merged with Tektronix Inc., quite an important event. The share issue at Profit Share was withdrawn but we now receive the balance in cash. When Tektronix Inc. shares were offered on the open market, they were many times over subscribed, both by Tek employees & other interested parties. Unlike Britain, American stock is not immediately offered on the Stock Exchange & so only a short initial rise in price resulted. However, greater things are expected when they are on Wall Street.

By and large then, 1963 has been a momentous year for Tektronix on its international front; at home, new buildings have been completed and new instruments have been added to our ever increasing

range of precision oscilloscopes.

Looking ahead at 1964 we see a formidable start in the establishing of Field Offices both in England and Switzerland.

Tektronix U.K. Limited are to be established in Harpendon under Harry Sellers. Harry came to us from Living ston Laboratories where naturally he had established connections with Tektronix. Several field engineers are going from here to join engineers from Livingston Laboratories. Tek U.K. and "Three L's" will work together in the marketing and maintenance of Tek instruments in the U.K.

In Switzerland at Zug. Tekintag has established its new field office under Peter Hejlsberg. Meanwhile there are no changes in the Controlling Company under the management of Mermann Harri, who has been with lek for quite some time now. The exact functions of Tekintag are rather complex and dwell both on the financial and legal aspects of our international operation. Total staff in Zug numbers about a dozen including locally recruited F.E.s now training here in Guernsey. Incidentally their instrument supply is from Guernsey.

Here in Guernsey the extension to La Villiaze is to start and the Tek Ltd Warehouse will move to Victoria Avenue. Several more instruments are expected to be added to the Guernsey amufacturing programme. Latest reports state that Tektronix Inc. shares are likely to hit Wall Street early in January and of course TEKTOPICS will always be around to keep you in touch.

A Year of Sport

As another year draws to a close, let's look back & see what has been happening in the field of sport at Tek.

Football and cricket have both had a good year, the former especially, finishing last season on a very high note by winning the annual business house knockout competition. The final took place in ideal conditions on Liberation Day morning last May and a large crowd, consisting mainly of Tek folk, turned out to watch because Tek 'A', expected finalists, were playing none other than Tek 'B' who had surprised everybody, even themselves, by also reaching the final. The 'A' team won 1-0 but, as the score suggests, it was not a 'walkover'.

Both the Tek cricket teams had a good year, the 'A's, being newly promoted, finished third in the Guernsey Cricket League 2nd Division and the 'B' team, showing a marked improvement over the previous year, finished third in the 3rd Division. There was also the 'Trios' competition which was run internally by Tek with a good entry of 14 teams.

In the second division of the Guernsey Badminton League the Tek men's and mixed teams did not have much success and in fact, it was decided to only enter a men's team for the new season which has just started. So far this season the team is without a point, they have lost all three matches but it is hoped that the section will continue to enter a team and that new players will join in the future to help put us on the winning trail. The cloud which has been hanging over Tektronix badminton, in fact, over badminton throughout the island, has now lifted with the welcome news that the appeal fund target set by the Guernsey Badminton Association has been reached. Building of their new hall will be started early in the new year and it will be finished before the start of next season.

A Tek team was one of six to enter a new league formed by the Guernsey Lawn Tennis Assoc. & although they failed to win any of their matches, everyone seemed to enjoy themselves. Club nights were held as usual at Beau Sejour on Mondays and the singles trophy was won by Peter Fulwell. Having finished bottom of the table tennis second division in the season which ended last April, Tek decided not to enter a team for the new season which has just started but already there is talk of reversing this decision for next year. It certainly would be heartening to see Tek re-enter competition in this sport and any one who is willing & keen enough to re-form a team should contact Ron Bridel. The annual contest for the S&SC. cup was held at the end of last season and once again was won by Ron.

Bowls & Fishing were both newcomers on the summer sporting scene at Tek this year, the former having already been introduced in our last issue. It seems that Emile Blaise's"Holiday in England last year" gave him a head start on the other players since he won this year's Tek singles title.

The fishing section began by organising two trips, for the first they hired a boat and competed for a newly presented S & SC cup. The result being a tie, a second trip was arranged on land this time - & all the competitors took part again. Bill Dowinton was the eventual winner with the highest aggregate of points over the two trips.

Darts has now entered its second season and there is still plenty of enthusiasm shown by the players. In April, the team ended up fourth in the second division of the business house league and is currently holding that same position after playing about a third of its matches in this new season. As usual, at the end of last season, Tek held it's own annual singles competitions, the winner of the ladies section was Janine Smith and Ron Hickman was the victor in the Mens event.

Chess is also very new as a section of the club. It was formed only about a month ago and they have some quite interesting ideas about making the game more attractive to watch as well as to play. They meet every Monday at 7.30 PM. downstairs at the Dorset Arms. Anyone who is interested is invited to go along or contact the Secretary, John Sarchet, for details. Internal tournaments are being arranged and help will be given in organising the S &SC's well established open tournament won this year by Emile Blaise.

There are no sections for Draughts or Shove-Halfpenny but a cup is presented annually by the Club to the winners of a knockout competition in each activity. This year, Jim Cutler won the cup for draughts and Norm Gardner won the shove halfpenny.
